WHAT HAS THE CIVIC LEAGUE DONE FOR ME LATELY? By Pam Clements

We all know that the civic league holds meetings, complies information for the directory, and maintains membership in the Virginia Beach Council of Civic Organizations and the Neighborhood watch program. We know that they organize and publicize our neighborhood events like the yard sale, block party, and holiday celebrations. We know that they keep our front entrance mowed, trimmed and looking neat. We know they share important information through our newsletters. But you may not have know about the other activities in which the civil league has been involved. Without their dogged efforts, our neighborhood could look vastly different than the charming place we now call home. Take a look at the list of their past accomplishments.

Examples of Homestead Civic League's Accomplishments

- Worked with the city to have "Cross Traffic Does Not Stop" signs installed at the north and south bound corners of Whitehurst Landing and Old Providence Roads.
- Worked with the city to have a sidewalk constructed on Whitehurst Landing Road between Thompson Way and Old Providence Road.
- Participated in a 2005 grass-roots effort to stop the Virginia Beach Residential Real Estate tax rate from rising above \$1.20 per \$100 of assessed value.
- Partnered with BSA Troop 12 to create the Homestead Heritage Garden at the front entrance.
- Took legal action and prevented the extension of Hillview Boulevard through to Indian River Road, preventing a major through-fare in the middle of the neighborhood.
- Fought for and achieved building single family homes on Old Providence instead of high density housing to be known as 'Stoney Brook Apartments'.
- Halted dumping of asphalt and hazardous waste into the borrow pit south of Westward Drive. Also,
 the original plan was to fill the lake in completely. The Civic League managed to achieve a compromise whereby the city bought an easement from Mr. Archibell and a 200 ft. buffer will remain between Homestead and the planned development, where homes will be built on the land created by
 filling in the borrow pit.
- **Neighborhood Watch:** Initiated and achieved membership in the Neighborhood Watch program.
- Streetlights: New, improved streetlights were installed due to Civic League efforts.
- Fence between Whitehurst Grove Park and Homestead: The Civic League convinced the city that the fence should be erected for the safety of both neighborhoods.
- City sewage installation: Some residents had not been able to use their home washing machine for years. Slowly (being approximately 30 years old), many septic systems were failing. The Civic League, supported by a great majority of Homestead residents, badgered the city long and hard enough to have it stop delaying city sewage installation in Homestead.
- Prevented construction of a gas station and 7-11 store at the corner of Whitehurst Landing and Old Providence Road (formerly "Providence Road").

Now, would you want your neighborhood to have a gas station and 7-11 on the corner? Would you want to still be dealing with an aging septic system? Would you want high density housing across the street? Would you want a Hillview Boulevard to be a major cut-through to Indian River Road? If you answered NO to these questions, thank a civic league member. If you want Homestead to continue to stay a quiet, sought-after neighborhood, then be sure to send in your civic league dues promptly. These **volunteers** work for **you**. Paying your dues shows you thank them for their efforts.

BIKE SAFETY IS A TWO-WAY STREET.



...so we encourage cyclists and motorists to ride and drive with a

heart – follow the rules of the road and respect each other. Road safety starts with the mutual understanding that bicyclists and motorists have the same rights and responsibilities when it comes to navigating the streets of Virginia Beach. From there, it's all about being courteous, safe and visible.



GIVE A MINIMUM OF 2 FEET. Motorists and bicyclists can share the road safely when everyone observes all traffic laws. When passing a cyclist on the road, drivers must give two feet or more of clearance. Responsible cyclists must also ride with

the flow of traffic, using proper hand signals and anticipating the actions of other road users. When riding two abreast, bicyclists cannot impede the movement of traffic, and need to move into single file when being overtaken from the rear.



WEAR THE PROPER GEAR. The grim reality is that about 1,000 American bicyclists die in crashes every year, with approximately 75% of those being from head injuries. Children ages 14 and under are five times more likely to sustain

bicycle crash-related injuries than any other age group. All bicyclists should wear properly fitted bicycle helmets every time they ride, as it is the single most effective way to prevent head injury resulting from a bicycle crash. Stay visible too; wear bright colors and use reflective equipment.



DON'T BE A BIKE SALMON. You know how salmon swim upstream to get to a particular destination? Bicyclists follow this risky example when riding against the flow of traffic. This wrong-way riding behavior endangers

everyone—motorists, pedestrians and other cyclists. Make the roads safe for everyone by following the rules of the road and going with the flow of traffic.

WHAT IS THE 2020 CENSUS?

The count is mandated by the Constitution and conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, a nonpartisan government agency. The 2020 Census counts the population in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories (Puerto Rico, American Samoa, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, Guam, and the U.S. Virgin Islands). Each home will receive an invitation to respond to a short questionnaire—online, by phone, or by mail. This will mark the first time that you will be able to respond to the census online.

The census provides critical data that lawmakers, business owners, teachers, and many others use to provide daily services, products, and support for you and your community. Every year, billions of dollars in federal funding go to hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, and other resources based on census data. The results of the census also determine the number of seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives, and they are used to draw congressional and state legislative districts.

It's also in the Constitution: Article 1, Section 2, mandates that the country conduct a count of its population once every 10 years. The 2020 Census will mark the 24th time that the country has counted its population since

There are three ways to respond to the 2020 Census. By April 1, 2020, every home will receive an invitation to participate in the 2020 Census. You will have three options for responding:

- Online.
- By phone.
- By mail.
- The 2020 Census marks the first time you'll have the option to respond online. You can even respond on your mobile device.

The 2020 Census will ask questions about

- How many people are living or staying at your home on April 1, 2020
- Whether the home is owned or rented.
- About the age, sex, race, and relationship of each person in vour home
- About whether a person in your home is of Hispanic, Latino, or Spanish origin.

Governments, businesses, communities, and nonprofits all rely on the data that these questions produce to make critical deci-

During the 2020 Census, the Census Bureau will *never* ask you for:

Your Social Security number.

- Money or donations.
- Anything on behalf of a political party.
- Your bank or credit card account numbers.

If someone claiming to be from the Census Bureau contacts you via email or phone and asks you for one of these things, it's a scam, and you should not cooperate. For more information, visit Avoiding Fraud and Scams.

What happens to your answers?

Your personal information is kept *confidential*. The Census Bureau is bound by federal law to protect your information, and your data is used only for statistical purposes.
