RECYCLING 101: DOs AND DON'TS FOR THE BIG BLUE BIN By Pam Clements

If you've ever wondered if that item is really recyclable, check out the FAQs on Tidewater Fiber's Website. http://www.tfcrecycling.com/community-education/recycling-guide

Most common items include junk mail, phone books, mixed papers, newspapers, aluminum foil, pie pans, metal lids, glass jars, cardboard and chipboard, #1 and #2 plastics (bottle shaped plastic with a neck) and aluminum, steel and tin cans.

Shred It, Don't Spread It: Tips for Recycling Shredded Paper Place it in a paper bag and staple it closed and mark the bag "Shredded Paper". If loose shredded paper is put into the recycle bin then it creates a confetti-like problem for our environment. Cross-Shredded paper is not recyclable and should be repurposed or placed in your trash can.

YARD SALE By Lieske Navarre


